**Distance:** 249 nautical miles, direct

### Changes to electronic payment of WFC invoice s (IPN)

Intuit (the makers of Quickbooks, WFC's accounting solution) will be discontinuing the Intuit Payment Network (IPN)

May 31, 2016. Intuit has developed a new elnvoicing option. In Intuit's words, "Customers can still pay you online and will enjoy an updated payment experience."

I will be using the old IPN system for the March bill-

ing, which was sent out early in April. In order to implement the new system, I need to upgrade to Quickbooks 2016, and then modify the existing memorized invoices to be consistent with the new elnvoicing system. That

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will occur in April, and the April billing, which will be sent out early in May, will be with the new system.

Here are some screenshots of the new eInvoicing system, as seen from the customer viewpoint. The first image is the email received by the customer, with the "View and Pay Invoice" button. The second image is the online view of the invoice, from which the invoice can be printed, saved as a pdf file, or paid. The third image is the payment window.



Initially, we will be enabling only ACH/bank payments.

## New Student Pilot Requirements by Dr. Pam Tarkington

As of April 1, 2016, student pilots will no longer obtain their student pilot certificate from their Aviation Medical Examiner (AME). This is a result of section 4012 of the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act.

The student pilot has several options to get their certificate. They can go to the Flight Standard District Office (FSDO), a designated pilot examiner, airman certificate representative of a flight school, or a certified flight instructor. Probably the easiest route

would be the flight instructor.

This new rule is to tighten security. The certificate will be a tamper proof plastic card.

As of now, the student pilot will still have to visit an AME to obtain a medical certificate.

Student pilots who have a current paper certificate may continue to use it until the expiration date. If the student pilot wishes to change to the

plastic certificate the fee will be \$2.00. The new student pilot certificate supposedly does not have an expiration date.

### CONJUNCTIVITIS

Also called “pink eye” and this is the most common eye disease.

It is an infection/inflammation of the white part of your eye. This is called pink eye as the white part of your eye has thousands of small blood vessels and when these become affected the white of the eye appears red/pink.

Causes include a viral or bacterial infection or an allergic reaction. If caused by bacteria or virus, it is highly contagious. Allergic conjunctivitis obviously is not contagious. Certain irritants ( soap,

chlorine, make-up, smoke and certain chemicals) can also lead to this condition.

Symptoms include itchy eyes, red eye, watery eye, discharge ( pink like or clear) and swelling of the eyelid. There may also be a crusty deposit in the nasal aspect of the eye.

Here is how it spreads: sharing towels, improper cleaning of contact lenses, close contact with an affected person, rubbing the affected eye and then the unaffected eye.

It (if not an allergic cause) will gen-

erally last 10-14 days without treatment and 2-3 days with treatment.

Here is how it is treated: if it is a bacterial infection, generally prescription eye drops are sufficient, but in more serious cases, an oral antibiotic may be necessary. Allergic conjunctivitis is treated with certain prescription eye drops and an antihistamine. Viral conjunctivitis generally requires no treatment; there is one exception: shingles ( herpes zoster) which is a medical emergency as it can lead to blindness.
