President – Provides oversight of the Club vision, finances, and sets long-term goals. This officer provides guidance and direction for the board, prioritizing issues for action, leads meetings for the board and the Club.

Vice-President – Serves in place of the President when necessary and helps with a financial review of budget and taxes.

Treasurer – Manages the Club and airport budget, P&L, billing, invoices, taxes, membership accounts, Club insurance, and interfaces with Club attorneys for legal issues. The Treasurer also acts as the voice of the Club with state and federal government officials.

Cool Places to Fly by Chris Houston

Destination: Reading Regional / Carl A Spaatz Field (KRDG), Reading, PA

Distance: 179 nautical miles

Why It's Cool:

Reading is home to the Mid-Atlantic Air Museum (www.maam.org), a medium sized air museum with a partially flyable collection. I last wrote about MAAM in the January 2015 newsletter, but having recently visited in October of this year — my first time in over nine years — it seemed appropriate to provide an update.

The museum's collection includes airworthy examples of a Grumman Avenger, a B-25 ("Briefing Time", which has put in appearances at Geneseo in the past), a Stearman Kaydet, a Vultee Valiant, and a North American SNJ (Naval variant of a T6 Texan).

An extensive ramp outside the museum is crowded with non-flying aircraft in the collection, one of





which is the unique Custer Channelwing STOL prototype able to maintain flight at 8-11 mph of airspeed! Sadly, the elements have abused many of the aircraft on display outdoors.

The crown jewel of the museum. and the reason for its founding in 1980, is the ongoing restoration of a P-61 Black Widow. The Black Widow was a late WWII design and is generally considered to be the first purpose-built night fighter for the U.S. Recovered from its crash site on the side of a mountain in New Guinea, restoration is moving slowly, but with the attention to detail necessary to someday return the aircraft to flight. Not only is this an unusual aircraft, but as one of only four surviving, it is also quite rare. A particular treat for me on this visit was to see how much progress had been made on the restoration since my previous visit in 2009. In 2018, the Black Widow finally looks like an airplane!

MAAM is a solid, medium-sized aviation museum and worth a visit.





Volunteer docents are available to provide tours. The last tour of the day starts at 3:00 pm. Admission is \$8 for adults, 6\$ for seniors 65+, \$3 for children ages 6 to 12, and free for kids five and under.

Every June, MAAM hosts an immersive World War II Weekend (In 2019, June 7-9) featuring warbirds, ground vehicles, and reenactors. Running annually for 25+ years, think of it as an airshow on steroids.

Hungry aviators can find food at Klinger's at the Airport in the terminal building located on the south end of the field, a very short taxi from the museum ramp. Klinger's recently replaced Malibooz, the prior long-standing restaurant on the field. Though I did not sample Klinger's, museum personnel assured me that it was good. The restaurant offers a nice view of the field; you can watch aircraft come and go while you dine.

Tips:

- The sectional depicts KRDG as occupying Class D airspace, but unlike many Delta airports, the field also has a dedicated approach frequency (125.15).
- Some of the MAAM aircraft fly on the airshow circuit. If you plan your visit during airshow season, some aircraft may not be on-site. My prior visits have all been outside the airshow season.
- MAAM has a dedicated webpage for fly-in visitors. Be sure to check it out and take note of the advice given on parking.
 Parking is free on the museum ramp, but you may earn yourself a fee if you park on the neighboring FBO ramp.
- 100LL is available at three different FBOs on the field, currently priced at \$5.43 to \$5.48.
