There are a number of reasons that we go through the effort to plan, organize, advertise, and undertake these events for the Club membership. I think they're worth mentioning:

- camaraderie: I have made some fantastic friends as a result of meeting members through activities events. As an aircraft owner, the biggest perk of being a member of the Williamson Flying Club is the people. This is also why I write the Member Spotlight column it has been a great way to get to know more of our members. (Member Spotlight will return next month.)
- New horizons: For me, one of the greatest joys of aviation is exploration. It's one of the reasons why I keep a map of every airport I've ever landed at as PIC (up to 221 as of last week). It is our hope that Activities Committee events will encourage our membership to visit new places. This is also the motivation behind the Cool Places To Fly column.
- Growth opportunities: Part of the value of going new places is adding new experiences and stretching our personal enve-

lopes and comfort zones. We fly the NYC skyline not only because it's an amazing view, but it encourages our pilots to talk with NYC controllers, which can be intimidating. Some of my favorite success stories from fly-outs involve relatively newlycertificated pilots visiting towered fields and navigating more complex airspace than they might have otherwise attempted on their own. Some of our members have become more confident and skilled pilots as a result of their participation in some of our events... and that's exactly the goal.

Real world general aviation for student pilots: We always try to fill open seats with other members, especially our student pilots. As you might imagine, open seats are not a resource that is readily controlled, but we do what we can. As a student riding along on an Activities Committee event, you'll get to see real world general aviation outside of the training environment. It's a way of getting direct visibility to the type of flying that you might do once you have your certificate in hand.

In closing, if you're interested in something we're planning, please join us! It's fun and we're looking forward to seeing you. Plus, there is something really enjoyable about flying places as part of a small fleet of aircraft.

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Cool Places To Fly by Chris Houston

My goal with this month's column is to provide some additional information around a planned daytrip to Detroit at the end of June. If you're wondering if you would want to participate in this event, please read on!

Destination: Coleman A Young Municipal (KDET), Detroit, MI

Distance: 265 nautical miles

Why It's Cool:

Historically, I've used KDET (formerly known as Detroit City Airport) as a convenient fuel stop. Located in Detroit, it is a towered Class Delta field situated just on the Michigan side of the USA / Canada border. The sole FBO on the field is AvFlight, a branch of the same Michigan-based FBO chain with a presence at Frederick Douglass / Greater Rochester International (KROC) that is managed by WFC member Bob Fratangelo. For a towered field, the fuel price is reasonable (\$5.25/gal self-serve). The self-service fuel is located on a ramp south of runway 7-25 and noted on the taxiway diagram as "Cargo Area". The last time I visited in February 2020, the self-serve fuel was inoperative, but AvFlight fueled me from the truck at the self-serve rate. Every interaction I have had with the staff at AvFlight has been top notch: the Detroit crew is a friendly bunch. I have never been charged any landing or ramp fees by AvFlight, though I have always bought fuel.

My first flight to KDET was particularly memorable because it was the first place I've ever had my landing clearance changed due to a coyote sighting on the intended runway. Those runways, by the way, are in excellent condition. It is obvious that there was a recent infusion of money into the airport.


In the last week, the airport <u>made</u> <u>headlines</u> with the unveiling of a statue honoring the Tuskegee Airmen. Coleman Young, namesake of the airport and the first black mayor of Detroit, was also a Tuskegee Airman.

Mostly, KDET is cool because it is an excellent gateway to the city of Detroit. On Sunday, June 27, we (the WFC Activities Committee) have a long daytrip planned to Detroit to visit The Henry Ford.

The Henry Ford Museum was dedicated in 1929 as the Edison Institute in honor of Ford's friend, Thomas Edison. Dedication took place exactly 50 years after Edison's invention of the incandescent light bulb. The original cornerstone bearing Edison's signature and footprints in concrete is on

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display in the entry hall to the museum. Of the museum, Henry Ford said, "I am collecting the history of our people as written into things their hands made and used.... When we are through, we shall have reproduced American life as lived, and that, I think, is the best way of preserving at least a part of our history and tradition..."

The museum is expansive. From cars to aircraft, trains to tractors, it is a vast space filled with noteworthy artifacts of an industrialized 20th Century: a Ford Trimotor named the *Floyd Bennett* that carried Admiral Byrd over the South Pole in 1929, the limousine in which JFK was assassinated, the very bus where Rosa Parks quietly began the civil rights movement. Not just artifacts; artifacts with meaning. It's quite a place.

While we're there, our goal is to tour The Rouge. Currently producing Ford's F-150 trucks, The Rouge was constructed in 1917 as Ford's first vertically-integrated manufacturing facility in which raw materials went in one end and finished cars came out the other. The iconic, original Ford Mustangs were produced at The Rouge. The tour is absolutely fascinating and an introductory film about Ford's life balances the man's accomplishments with his failings.

Tips:

 The direct route from KSDC to KDET involves an overflight of Canada. I have been flying this route both VFR and IFR since 2006. It is easy to do and is available even though the border is currently closed.

- If IFR, simply file as you would to any US airport and the transborder operation will be transparent to you.
- If VFR, you need to be on an active VFR flight plan (a DVFR flight plan is not necessary), be talking with ATC during the border crossings (on both ends), and on a discrete squawk code (not 1200). Buffalo Approach is the controlling agency on the Canada/NY border on 126.5 MHz Selfridge Approach controls the crossing on the Canada/MI border on 119.6 MHz. It rarely happens, but if flight following is terminated while transiting Ontario, simply contact the appropriate US approach facility before crossing the border back into the US.
- Take your passport, just in case of an emergency.
- Canada does not recognize BasicMed in their airspace. All PICs should hold at least a 3rd Class medical.

Stay tuned for more details. Our goal will be to get a read on how many people are coming so that we can arrange suitable ground transportation.

Opinion: What Would You Do? By Chris Houston

I personally believe that "always leave yourself an out" is one of the most important safety concepts in aviation, a philosophy that was crystallized for me when I did flight training in the Rocky Mountains. We can implement all kinds of Plan Bs, but what happens if we, as pilots, become incapacitated? What then?

My wife has always been hesitant to take the controls of our airplane. She knows that it will happily fly hands-off when properly trimmed. She has no problem setting transponder codes or changing radio frequencies. But actually touching the flight controls? No way. In her mind, if she touched the controls, the wings would retract into the fuselage and the plane would plummet from the sky like a rock. Intellectually, she knows that it's an irrational fear.

My instrument instructor even tried to sweet talk her into letting him teach her enough to make a safe landing in our Warrior. She already knows how all the instruments work, it would just be a matter of learning the physicality of landing. Her answer? *Nope. No way*.
